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Meter of the Month

My Meter of the Month is a Pitney Bowes frank from 1989 and has been found by Peter Mantell. It shows an astonishing error in the meter serial number because there was never any series of the form 'P.B.1xxxW'. The complete image is shown below.



So what should the serial number have read? Your editor has carried out some research in order to find the answer. Readers interested in meters from that period will recall that there were three Pitney Bowes machines whose serial numbers included a 'W' suffix, namely 'P.B.D', 'P.B.L' and 'P.B.T'.

My first observation is that the impression is exceptionally clear – indicating it was almost certainly produced by a brand new machine at that time. My records reveal the highest numbers for the series with a 'W' suffix included the following: 'P.B.D 1166 W' dated 29.09.88, 'P.B.L 1880 W' dated 27.10.83 and 'P.B.T 1222 W' dated 30.10.78. From this alone, it would seem very likely to be from a 'P.B.D' series machine as machines that would have been 5 or 10 years old at that time would surely show some signs of wear.

Further research has also revealed that 'P.B.D' machines always included three wavy lines in the value die, whereas the 'P.B.L' and 'P.B.T' series didn't. Surely, therefore, we must conclude that it should have read 'P.B.D 1416 W', i.e. from the model 6320/6330.


Meter Correction Handstamps



Franking Error

Peter Mantell has spotted this item with a '5' in the Advanced Mail Code (instead of an 'S').



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Recent Interesting Items

Peter Mantell reports this 'Zero Test' frank that has been applied as a date-correction by the user, Great Western Railways. The original frank in the upper position is dated (Saturday) 12-12-15, but the lower frank, applied on a label, is dated (Tuesday) 15-12-15.



The Mail Type code on the original frank is '1403' (indicating Advanced Mail service) with an item count of '0402704', whereas the Mail Type code on the Zero Test frank is '9995' and has an item count of '0406647'.

Mailmark[™] News

On page 168-8 we reported 'A ROW1 20g' as having the Mail Type code '6016'. Peter Mantell now reports this 'A ROW1 10g with the same code.



The item concerned was applied to an inland mail item and we can only assume that the operator failed to reset the machine after franking an overseas item.

Note that this same machine has been in the news before. On page 173-6 it produced a very strange printing 'hiccup' but it is not thought that the two events are connected.

This report means that the Mail Type table (last shown in full on page 178-8) can be updated as follows:

Peter Mantell has also found this frank from Vinci Construction with the logo and Return Address block in black.




Peter Mantell has found this item with a colourful logo from the Kensington and Chelsea Tenant Management Organisation.



Meter Thematics

Peter Mantell sends the only two Christmas thematics reported so far this season. The first is a rather attractive design that has the feel of a pre-loaded slogan but not reported before. Peter has the user of this machine recorded as 'Westmore Document Management and Mailstream Solutions' based in Alcester, B49 6PU.



The second is a standard slogan and comes from an outdoor clothing company called Sherwood Forest. This machine, PB2006795, has since been replaced by PB2011321 shown on page 4 as a highest number.



Duncan James sends this frank from the Ross County Football Club, depicting a stag's head and antlers. The colour version of their team emblem is shown alongside.





Duncan also sends this attractive 'piggy bank' from a Company called Utility Warehouse, based at 508 Edgware Road, The Hyde, London, NW9 5AB.

Peter Mantell sends this frank from Newport City Homes that depicts the town's Transporter bridge – one of only eight remaining in use worldwide. The bridge was built in 1906 and is a Grade 1 listed structure.



Finally, my Meter Thematic of the Month is awarded to Peter Mantell for this image of the planet Jupiter. It comes from a company called Jupiter Asset Management Ltd., based in the Westminster region of London. Note that the dot of the letter 'i' of 'Jupiter' has been positioned to represent the planet's largest moon, Ganymede.
