My Meter of the Month comes from Jim Ashby and shows the shorter (squashed) version of a Friden specimen frank from 1971. These 'G' prefix franks came from models 410/420 and the higher specification models 9010/9020 and first sold in the UK in 1970. Jim also sends a specimen cover, shown below, with the longer version of the frank. All models were assigned numbers in the same series and about 1100 in total were sold in the UK.


Contributor's initials and other details are shown in the bottom left of each image.








Duncan James reports this highest number which also interesting because it comes from the village of Scarinish on the Isle of Tiree in the Inner Hebrides. It is the main village on the island and has a total population of just 650. The user is not known but it could well be the only franking machine currently being used on the island. The item also bears a circular meter date-correction handstamp, applied at Glasgow Mail Centre.

Recent Interesting Items

Duncan James reports two interesting items this month. The first is a pre-loaded 'HANDLE WITH CARE' slogan - with a significant alignment problem between the upper and lower print heads.



The next is this rather nice rhyming slogan from Charcon Creations. The company sells spare LEGO pieces and is based in Herne Bay, Canterbury, Kent.

Peter Mantell reports this frank where the user return address is repeated. It comes from the Northern Ireland Housing Executive in Londonderry.



Peter has also found another 'repeated address' frank – this time from a company called Russell Worth Ltd., based in Plymouth, Devon.



Further to the report on page 189-6 of meter serial FM2650489, Peter Mantell reports a similar occurrence with just the date showing in the town die. The user details are unknown.



Further to page 178-6 and earlier, Duncan James reports a fourth example of a meter with a QR code - from a company called 'Home Ideas & Gifts Galore' based in Honiton, Devon.



Surprisingly, the QR code decodes as "This is an example of DataMatrix Barcode 1236 9234235345334". It does not, therefore, contain a link to the company's web address and hence it is not much use to the person receiving the item! Your editor has no idea whether the string of numbers has any meaning or not.

Security Codes on Pitney Bowes Design H franks

In past newsletters we have occasionally made reference to the security block that appeared on many of the Pitney Bowes models that were manufactured from the mid-1990s onwards. These blocks are only found on Design H franks and comprise either one or two vertical columns to the left of the town die. On the higher speed (PB5 series) models, the single column indicated a visible item count, whereas all other models had two columns in the security block with the right hand column encrypted. When these initially appeared, the first digit in that column had a fixed '1' to indicate Pitney Bowes, followed by 5 encrypted digits. However, we have only ever been able to decode two of those 5 digits and it is now unlikely that your editor will ever be able to set aside enough time to further the investigation. It is therefore probably a good time to 'close the chapter' on this topic.

In the May 2001 newsletter (on page 7-3) we included a report on the PB2, PB7 and the original PB30 / PB37 series, that two of the encrypted digits were constant for any given machine. Furthermore, we provided a formula for calculating what those two digits were, dependent on the meter serial number.


Then in June 2004 (on page 44-1) things became more complicated with the introduction of the PB8 series when the number of encrypted characters in the right-hand column was increased to 7 - the first four characters being in hexadecimal. On page 50-7, a suggested modification to the earlier formula was given to take account of this new series. However, it now seems that was not the full story as at some stage those two 'constant digits' no longer appeared in the encryption - as seen in these examples from PB843619 in October 2009:





Then in November 2010 (on page 121-5) our hopes were raised that we might be able to break the code when your editor found an 'item number 1' on a PB0 series frank but even the discovery of this item did not help.

This month, we include the following 'zero value' frank from machine PB899973 which was one of 14 specimen franks kindly sent by Wang Jingsheng in Beijing. These franks were printed at the same time as the test report that was previously shown on page 183-1.

At some point in the future, the above table may be helpful to anyone wishing to further investigate the encryption used on these machines.

Historic Meters - 'Design A' UPF machines

Further to last month (page 189-14), Jim Ashby owns a similar '2A' in white within a rectangular block on a specimen cover - the top half of which is shown below.



Unfortunately, the date is not clear on this example, but your editor thinks it possibly reads '5 JAN 24'. The town die on this frank is 'London E.C.4.', compared with 'London W.C.2' on the item shown last month.

However, Jim believes that both examples are actually from a Universal "Special Midget" rather than a "High Speed" model for two reasons:

- The High Speed used date slugs, with the day and month positioned above the year, whereas the Special Midget had a single row date printed using a rotary date die.
 Date figures on the Special Midget were also much smaller than those on the High Speed.
- The Special Midget could print a slogan, whereas this was not possible on the High Speed due to the size of the printing drum.

Peter Mantell sends this kite design from Voyage Care based in the cathedral city of Lichfield, Staffordshire.





Peter Mantell sends all of the thematic franks on this page, starting with this one depicting the Colne Community School and College in Brightlingsea, Essex.




Staying with schools, here is an attractive heraldic design from St Peter's Catholic High School in Wigan.








This one comes from a company called Popinz based in Romford, which sells themed customised shoes and accessories.
