It is some time since we published a full list of members and hope to do so next March, please let us have any changes, including where applicable new county names - we know Scotland's do not apply yet - and postal codes.



RONEO-NEOPOST MODEL 105-2

We have listed this in our book as being MV 3-bank, but have now had an opportunity to study the publicity material in greater detail.

This states that there is a 21-value range (from $\frac{1}{2}$ to $10\frac{1}{2}$ in stages of $\frac{1}{2}$) and from the illustration which we reproduce below it would seem that it is in fact a 2-bank machine with the first bank running from 1 to 10 and the second with just the $\frac{1}{2}$ (or nothing at all if the fraction is not required).



SOUTH WEST AFRICA

This listing of the meter stamps of South West Africa has been compiled by Mr. George R. Pearson from information given in the Barfoot-Simon catalogue, previous issues of the M.S.B. and from the collections of Mr. S.D. Barfoot, Mr. J.C. Mann and that of the author.

With few exceptions, the designs used for South West Africa are similar to those of South Africa and, in one or two cases, South African frank dies were adapted for use in South West Africa. The machines are generally numbered in a separate series but there are exceptions, which are mentioned in the text.

The dates shown are those of introduction or, where this is not known, the earliest seen. For multi-value machines, the lowest value that the machine could register is given.





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"MISSING" VALUE FOUND ON WEMBLEY MACHINE

For many years we have recorded five values, $\frac{1}{2}d$, 1d, $1\frac{1}{2}d$, $2\frac{1}{2}d$ and 6d, on the Universal N.Z. machine fitted with a special townmark for the Wembley Exhibition and listed in our book as Type 10 with a black townmark and Type 11 with red townmark.

We had postulated the existence of a further denomination as these were 6-value machines some years ago and the "Stamp Lover" of November 1926 listed a 1/- value with both black and red townmarks.

Dr R. A. McInroy has now acquired a set of covers from this machine (with red townmark) which includes this 1/- value, so we can now be certain of its existence in at least Type 11.

Roneo-Neopost Model 205. Mr Bogue reports that J 8041, which was the highest "pre-decimal" number, has appeared in decimal form.

Neopost L.V. Michel de Wailly reports a "new" value for the GviR cipher design, our number 39. This is the $8\frac{1}{2}$ d used on London E.C.2. N 78 on the 8 VI 55

Isle of Man. Mr G. A. Topp reports the Roneo-Neopost Model 205 in the same design as the other R-N models. Used from Douglas on 21 XI 74 this is P 143 and so one at least of the short-lived prefix went "overseas". We understood that the "P" dies in Great Britain were being gradually withdrawn but whether this one will be remains to be seen.

George Pearson shows us another Model 205 with the "normal" prefix, JU 145, also from Douglas, on 3 V 74

Werner Simon reports Roneo-Neopost Model 505 number RN 7831 (Douglas), used as late as 25 VII 74 but fitted with its Great Britain die.

A NEW ISRAEL CATALOGUE

"Catalog of the Meter Postage Stamps of Israel" by C. H. Smith and Werner Simon, 9 large pages, profusely illustrated with valuations in US Dollars. Available from C. H. Smith, Apt 201, 605 North Louise Street, Glendale, California 91206, U.S.A., price \$1.00 USA plus postage at the rate of \$0.31 for surface and \$1.04 air mail.

This is an excellent work which covers all the issues of Israel, with notes on the numbering systems, including the latest ones. Each main type is illustrated and the valuations include separate ones for each value in the Neopost LV. The machines used during the mandate are not listed.

EIRE - Parcel Post Machines.

During the summer Michael Richards visited Eire and was able to visit a large number of post offices and obtain impressions from what we call the Plessey machines - they were formerly T.I.M. - used there.

In our G.B. book we list as P.P.5 a decimal type with "pt" at the left but he was surprised to find that in a number of cases the original design (P.P.4) with "P & T" was still in use although now modified for decimal currency by the removal of the shilling bar and the substitution of a "p" instead of a "D" at the right of the value.

All these are lettered BAILE ATHA CLIATH which seems to bear out the theory that they are numbered consecutively throughout the city, he was also told that there were at least two machines held in reserve, presumably some of the missing numbers. As they all have the same inscription they could also move about of course without any alteration to the dies.

Outside Dublin he found :

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CORK Number 1 (one machine only) 2nd design.
WATERFORD Number 1 (one machine only) 1st design.
LIMERICK Number 1 (one machine only) 1st design.
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The modified first design will of course be an addition to our listing in the GB book.


Mr K. B. Millar also writes with a report that machine number 5 was in use at Rathgar, Dublin 6, on the 18th September 1974 and this lends weight to the theory that the machines move about between the various Dublin offices.

They continue to be an interesting group of machines !

A NEW MANUFACTURER FROM JAPAN ?

Some time ago we received a copy of a listing of Japanese meters compiled by a Mr Ishii in Japan. This was in fact almost entirely written in Japanese charecters so some of the finer points may have been missed by us, we are not able to read Japanese at all.

Among the types illustrated was the one on the left below from Nihonbashi which a collector of the country told us was a fiscal machine






Mr Werner Simon now shows us the one on the right, definately postage, and comparison again of the four charecters at the left on each suggests to us that the first is also postage.

We have no idea who the manufacturer is although it has often seemed surprising that a machine has not been developed in Japan, nor can we fully understand the date which is shown as 470810 but think that the 47 is the (Japanese) year, 08 the month and the 10 the day. Can anyone help?

The value is shown on the second line.

IRAN. A Satas with ST prefix and a B suffix. (WHB)

ISRAEL. The Postalia also exists with the double-letter indicating use by a government department.

Satas number 538 has figures of value as *0.oi and has the same initial letter resembling a sideways D as 396 which we also described as a Satas.

Frama number 2050 has figures of value as 0.01 (SDB)


ITALY. Hasler F66 with number under frank H66m1850 and value as *00.= used from Catania in VI.72

A change in the design of franks has resulted in smaller leaves at left and right - they leave a space at top and bottom - and "POSTE ITALIANE" is shorter. Sima, Francotyp and Hasler F88 all seen.



Notes and News from Overseas - Italy (Contd)

We show two more of the machines used for Registered Post, each of these has a square below the townmark instead of a triangle. 271 shows a zero impression (these are used when the postal charges have already been paid and all that is wanted is the Registered number etc.) and it will be seen that the "figures of value" show as ***** This would seem to imply that at least the right hand value wheel is capable of printing both a zero and an asterisk. prefix ARe seems to be new. (SB)



JAPAN. Frama, from Werner Simon, he also shows us an NCR lettered "EXPO 70 CSAKA JAPAN", presumably only in use during the period of the exhibition.

KOREA (SOUTH) Postalia KP 118 in the "Pagoda" design has a much larger value box, four figures of value as 0,001 (or ? 0,010 with a fixed zero at the right) and the figures themselves are in a much heavier style. Used from Seoul on 18.8.74 (J. Fowler). Mr Bogue shows us another impression from the same machine, this time on a "tape" which has a pattern of wavy lines with "vertical" ovals each of which has "Republic of Korea" printed in them vertically, all in yellow.



KUWAIT. Postalia 1, the first Postalia we have seen with double figures of value ("Arabic" over "European") and also the Pitney Bowes Model 6300 (ESL)


Mr W. H. Bogue shows us another impression from ? No 3 which has some differences. This has KUWAIT at the top left and KD (instead of Fils) at the left of the value. We assume that KD stands for Kuwaiti Dinar.

He also shows us a Pitney Bowes Series 5000 number P.B.No 108 which has the "No 108" enclosed in a frame.



<u>LEBANON</u>. We have mentioned that the Pitney Bowes machines now have the number at the side of the frank and show two forms, upwards at the right and also downmards at the left. PB 124 formerly had the number in very small letters underneath.

LIECHTENSTEIN. Every time we record a machine from here it is different! Mr K. B. Millar shows us this? Frama which does not have a Roman/Arabic number underneath the machine number.

MALAZSIA. Pitney Bowes Model 6300 (J. Fowler), also P.B.457 from Mr Bogue.

MEXICO. The Hasler (? F66) in the design with a pillar at the right has three forms of figures of value. We have already noted 6769 as 90.0i and lr Lapham tells us of z001 and z01

MOZAMBIQUE. We have mentioned the Post Office machines (they have CCT instead of a number usually) and in view of the recent political changes which will probably affect the design of meters we list them as follows, thanks to Mr Lapham. Some of them have been mentioned before.
